

Every Curriculum has also been reviewed and approved by two former 1st-grade teachers with a combined almost 100 years of teaching experience. Activities and stories are "kid-approved" through testing with my own children and the children I teach.

Centers

For Preschools: Children learn best through play. Underlined activities in the Lesson Plans may be used as a learning center in the classroom. Centers offer hands-on, play-based opportunities where the child guides the learning.

Themes

Literacy

Each Lesson Plan includes a Book of the Week that connects to the weekly theme. These carefully selected classic books are ideal for preschool-age children and support key learning goals. Curriculum suggestions help the adult build interest in the story, support comprehension, encourage imagination, and teach the child to use visual clues while reading. Once familiar with the book, the child is encouraged to fill in key words and rhyming words and discuss vocabulary by breaking words into syllables. Additional activities provide even more opportunities for learning and practice.



Letters/Numbers

Handwriting

The *4 Year Curriculum* bridges the *3 Year Curriculum* and kindergarten. Building on prior learning, and when developmentally ready, the child practices writing letters and numbers on lined paper using a five-step process. Letters and numbers are taught by ease of formation rather than alphabetical or numerical order, beginning with straight-line forms. This approach gives the child early success, builds confidence, and prepares the child for more challenging formations. Letter and Number Formation Charts support correct formation throughout the process.




4 Year Activity Book

Active Phonics

Repeating, manipulating, hearing, and combining phonetic sounds form the foundation of reading and are further developed in the *4 Year Curriculum*. The child strengthens letter sound knowledge through Active Phonics, the Ice Cream Phonics Chant, and Letter Phonic Songs. Each week, the child adds a scoop to a large ice cream cone displayed on the wall, reinforcing learning in a visual and engaging way.

Rhyming is introduced through poems, songs, and books. While it may seem silly to adults, rhyming is fun for children and plays an important role in reading success. As a key phonemic awareness skill, rhyming helps children hear and manipulate sounds in words, strengthening their oral language. It also helps them recognize the rhythm of language, which supports fluency and comprehension. Below are some of the poems the child will enjoy learning.

Overview

Unique to the *4 Year Curriculum*, the child is introduced to character traits through examples found in Bible stories. Activities support both the Bible story and the character trait. As part of the Bundle, the ABCJesusLovesMe Interactive Bible Stories include age-appropriate scripts that actively involve the child. Optional flannelgraph suggestions add visual and tactile learning opportunities. Comprehension questions at the end of each story provide a natural way to continue the conversation.







Books of the Bible

To study the Bible effectively, I believe it is important to know the order of the Books of the Bible. With fun repetition, most preschool children can learn this skill. In the Curriculum, the New Testament books are divided into small groups, introduced gradually every few weeks, following the pattern of a simple song. The New Testament Song is included in the Bible Song Packet, with a video available on the website.

Development

“Play gives children a chance to practice what they are learning.” – Fred Rogers

Overview

Fine motor skills help the child manipulate small objects and prepare for writing. Gross motor skills involve large muscle movements, such as running, jumping, and hopping, and support balance and coordination. Each Lesson Plan includes activities that strengthen both fine and gross motor skills; for best results, crayons and pencils are recommended instead of markers or pens. Sample activities are provided below.

In addition, each Lesson Plan in the *ABCJesusLovesMe 4 Year Curriculum* includes visual perception activities. Visual perception is the process of translating to the brain what the eyes see, which is essential for reading and writing. These activities support brain–eye communication and can help address visual perception challenges.

Starting the 4 Year Curriculum

Bible/Character

Unique to the *4 Year Curriculum*, character traits are introduced to the child through the truth found in Bible stories. Each week includes activities that support both the Bible story and the featured character trait. It is important to read the Scripture yourself to ensure you are familiar with the details of the story. The ABCJLM Interactive Bible Stories provide an age-appropriate script and comprehension questions to actively engage the child in the storytelling process. This supplemental resource is available as a digital download, included in the Curriculum Bundle, or can be purchased separately on the ABCJLM website.

Bible Songs and Memory Verses

Timeless Bible songs have been carefully chosen to help children memorize and embrace God’s Word. Each week also introduces a simple memory verse set to song. If a song is new to you, free videos with actions are included via the weekly QR codes to make learning easy. The Bible Song and Memory Verse Digital Download Packet is another tool to aid in learning.

New Testament Books of the Bible

To study the Bible effectively, I believe it is important to know the order of the Books of the Bible. With fun repetition, most preschool children can learn this skill. In the Curriculum, the New Testament books are divided into small groups, introduced gradually every few weeks, following the pattern of a simple song (pg 110). Scan the QR code on pg 9 to access the New Testament Song.

Example Weekly Bible Schedule

Day 1: **Read** the story from *The Beginner’s Bible or My First Hands-On Bible*, using the page number listed in the Supplies.

Day 2: Read the **Interactive Bible Story script**. Use optional visuals such as flannelgraph or simple props.

Day 3: **Review** the script by reading it again, pausing to let the child fill in key points, names, or actions.

Day 4: Guide the child in **retelling** the story by prompting with simple questions (Who? What happened next?). Act out parts of the story together using motions or props.

Day 5: **Comprehension questions** are included in the Interactive Bible Stories Digital Download.

Unsure How to Teach?

Teaching a child a new concept can feel daunting. Where do I begin? What do I say? When do I say it? How do I get the child to sit still? Find the answers to these questions by scanning the QR code provided on pg 9.

“I am Learning” Objective Poster

The Objective Poster (found in the *4 Year Activity Book*) helps you track the weekly objectives. Transfer these objectives to the activity sheet and display it in a visible place. After a couple of times, this transfer usually takes less than 10 minutes. To reuse the sheet, place it in a dry erase pocket or picture frame and use a dry or wet erase marker. Preschools can also send the updated sheet home each week to encourage learning beyond the classroom.



Broken Crayons/Rainbow Write

Throughout the Curriculum, the child will often use a broken crayon (less than 1” in length) for coloring and writing. Occupational therapists have found that using broken crayons naturally encourages the child to grip the utensil correctly—with the thumb and index finger, supported by the middle finger.

Additionally, the child will be instructed to “rainbow write.” This means the child writes the letter or number once with a chosen color and then writes it again using a different color to create a “rainbow.” This technique allows the child to practice multiple times on the same activity sheet with various colors. For more handwriting tips, scan the QR code provided on pg 9.

Starting the 4 Year Curriculum

Writing/Phonics

The *4 Year Curriculum* serves as a bridge between the *3 Year Curriculum* and kindergarten.

Building on the foundational formation skills taught in the *3 Year Curriculum*, the child—if developmentally ready—will begin writing letters and numbers using a five-step process. Rather than introducing letters and numbers in alphabetical or numerical order, they are taught based on the ease of formation, beginning with straight-line characters. This approach provides early success and builds the child's confidence before moving on to more complex shapes. If the child has not yet learned to follow the green/red dots and lines taught in the *3 Year Curriculum*, take time to teach these skills first. The Pre-Writing Sheets included in the separate *Handwriting Curriculum* can be used for additional practice. See link in the QR code on pg 9.

Five-Step Writing Process:

1. Trace the bubble letter or number with the index finger while saying the Number Rhyme or Letter Formation Chant.
2. Rainbow write by tracing over the yellow guide.
3. Rainbow write using the green and red dots as guides.
4. Rainbow write using only the green dot.
5. Rainbow write using the lines and the box as a guide.

Because it's important for the child to progress at a pace suited to their individual developmental readiness, it is important that handwriting be done one-on-one (e.g. during centers). Even if the child remains on Steps #1 or #2 throughout the Curriculum, do not move forward until the child is ready. Advancing too soon can cause frustration, develop poor habits, and create a negative attitude toward writing.

Teaching: Formation Rhymes and Chants

Numbers: A Number Rhyme is included for each number to assist the child in learning number formation. The original source of the rhymes is unknown.

Letters: While teaching handwriting to my children, I realized that just a few basic movements create all 26 letters of the alphabet. I created simple Formation Chants to teach these repeated motions. Say these chants each time the child forms a letter to promote muscle memory and correct writing habits.

Active Phonic

Each letter includes an example word and an action to help the child connect the letter to its phonetic sound. For example, say the letter name and sound “A /a/” while performing the action and saying the word “apple.” This objective is essential for building pre-reading skills.

Optional: Letter and Number Books

The *My First Steps to Math* and *My First Steps to Reading* series by Jane Moncure are the best books I have found for teaching numbers, letters, and phonetic sounds. Although these books are no longer in print, I highly encourage you to search for them at public libraries, on Amazon, Ebay, or in used book stores—they are that good! Each book is titled *My ___ Book* and should be read alongside the corresponding week's letter and number.

Ice Cream Cone and Chant

Create an Alphabet Ice Cream Cone (or Sundae) by adding the lesson's letter(s) to the cone each week. Cut out ice cream scoops from the Ice Cream Cone template provided in the *4 Year Activity Book*, using various colored construction paper. Write the letters of the week on the scoops. Display the cone (or sundae) on the wall, and each day, count the scoops, review the colors, or say the letter, its phonetic sound, and a phonic word that starts with that letter (e.g., L /l/ lion). By the end of the year, the ice cream cone or sundae will contain 52 scoops for each lowercase and uppercase letter! To aid phonemic awareness, each week use the Ice Cream Chant to help the child learn how words change based on the letters in them. Add the letter of the week before “yummy.” Laugh together about the funny words you create.

Themes

Weekly themes are included in the *4 Year Curriculum* to introduce the child to the world around them through use poems, math, and science.

Poems

Phonemic Awareness

Phonemic awareness—the ability to hear, identify, and manipulate individual sounds—is critical for reading and spelling success. In the *4 Year Curriculum*, this important skill is introduced each week through fingerplays, poems, and books.

Although these activities may seem silly to adults, they are both fun for the child and essential for early literacy development. Rhyming helps the child hear and play with sounds in words, improves oral language skills, and builds a strong foundation for reading fluency and comprehension. As the child becomes familiar with poems and books, they begin to anticipate rhyming words and recognize the rhythm of language.

Children develop phonemic awareness at their own pace. Introduce and discuss rhymes patiently, trusting that with time, the child's skills will grow naturally.

The Poem Digital Download Packet, included in the Bundle, is a useful tool for posting and practicing poems. The visuals are especially helpful for children from diverse backgrounds or with vocabulary delays, helping them connect words to images.

Math/Science

Under the Math/Science objectives, the child will be introduced to foundational concepts such as colors, shapes, spatial words, seasons, senses, and more. The child will also learn to write numbers 0-9. These concepts are often connected to the week's theme.

Name

In the *3 Year Curriculum* the child learned to recognize, order the letters, and trace their first name on 3" letters. The *4 Year Curriculum* picks up from here with the goal that the child will be able to write his name on 1" lined paper.

Starting the 4 Year Curriculum

Books

Experts agree that children should be read to for at least 15 minutes a day. Each week the child will be introduced to a quality picture book to supplement other learning and provide pre-reading exposure. Read the selected book at least once daily for maximum learning. "When young children hear the same story, song, or phrase repeatedly, their brains are actually building and strengthening neural pathways. These connections—formed through repeated, familiar experiences—lay the foundation for memory, language development, and deeper understanding."

Example Weekly Reading Schedule

Day 1: Picture Walk

Before reading, guide the child through a "picture walk." Look through the illustrations together and predict what the story might be about. Encourage the child to describe what they see and make guesses about the plot. This helps build excitement for the story, improves comprehension, stimulates creativity, and teaches children to use visual cues as a reading tool. Learn more in the QR code.

Day 2: Read with Expression

Read the book aloud with excitement and animated voice changes. Use facial expressions and tone to bring the story to life and keep the child engaged.

Day 3: Vocabulary

Each week I have selected words from the books that the child may or may not be familiar with. These words are purposefully chosen to expand the child's vocabulary, especially for dual language learners. For each word, provide extra context to help the child understand its meaning. Introduce more or less words based on the child's exposure and interest.

Day 4: Make Connections

While reading, connect the story to the child's own experiences. Ask questions like, "Have you ever felt like the character?" or "When have you done something similar?"

Day 5: Summarize the Story

Help the child retell the story by identifying what happened at the beginning, middle, and end. Encourage the child to use their own words and point to illustrations for support if needed. Being able to determine the key points is a crucial learning step.

Additional Ideas

Development

Fine and Gross Motor Activities

Fine motor skills involve the ability to manipulate small objects and write, while gross motor skills focus on large muscle movements like running, jumping, and hopping. Both types of skills are important for pencil control, balance, and coordination. Each Lesson Plan includes activities to strengthen both skills.

Children develop fine motor skills best when they work on a vertical surface. While holding a writing utensil or brush against a vertical surface, muscles in the wrist and hand are strengthened. These same muscles are not used when writing on a horizontal surface. For this reason, place craft, writing, and drawing projects on a vertical surface as much as is feasible (i.e. on an easel, wall, or door). Instead of using markers and pens, use broken crayons and short pencils to better support muscle development.

Visual Perception Activities

Each Lesson Plan in the *4 Year Curriculum* includes a visual perception activity. Visual perception refers to how the brain interprets what the eyes see, and accurate perception is essential for reading and writing. These activities not only help address visual perception issues but also strengthen the connection between the brain and eyes. Some activities may be challenging for the child, while others may be easier. Additional activity sheets can be purchased through the *ABCJLM Visual Perception Curriculum* to provide further support. Activity: Beautiful Feet

Use a paint brush to apply paint to the bottoms of the child's feet, then help the child press their feet onto a large sheet of paper to create footprints. *Adult: Add the title "Beautiful Feet" at the top of the paper.* You may also include footprints from family members or classmates to make it a group activity. As you work, talk with the child about how feet can be "beautiful" (Romans 10:15) when they are used to obey God—just like Noah obeyed by doing what God asked him to do.

Write the child's name on a notecard, using an uppercase letter for the first letter and lowercase letters for the rest. Each week, ask if the Letters of the Week appear in the child's name. You can also include names of family members or classmates by writing each on a separate notecard. Create a wall chart titled "Is the letter ___ in your name?" with two columns labeled Yes and No. Place each name card in the appropriate column based on whether the Letter of the Week appears in that name. Repeat this activity each week. Learn more by scanning the QR code.

Continue each week by choosing different scoops to review, remembering that while repetition can feel boring to adults, it is essential for a child's learning.

Math & Science

Colors

This week's focus is on colors: black, red, brown, white, purple, blue, orange, green, yellow. Talk about colors in all of the activities as well as in the child's play and daily activities. If the child has not been introduced to colors prior to this Curriculum, focus on one color per week using only that color in all craft and writing activities. The ABCJLM website contains poems, books, and activities for each color in the QR code.







Gross Motor Activity: Twister

Adapt the traditional game of Twister to help preschoolers practice color recognition while engaging in active play. Lay a Twister mat flat on the floor, or arrange colored circles in a similar pattern. Make sure there is plenty of space for the child to move safely. Call out a color, and have the child find and stand on that color. Use basic colors such as black, white, blue, brown, green, yellow, orange, red, and purple. As the child moves, encourage saying the color out loud. For added fun and movement, invite the child to touch the color with different body parts like a hand, elbow, or toe. This activity works well with one child or a small group.

Visual Perception Activity: Scissors Use

Instruct the child to cut along the lines on the Cut Lines activity sheet. Remind the child to use the dominant hand for cutting while the other hand moves the paper. Watch that the elbows stay close to the body and the thumbs point upward. If possible, spread the activity over several days by cutting just a few lines each day. Scan the QR code for more tips.

Assessment

The 4 Year Assessment is designed to evaluate what a child knows at the beginning of the **4 Year Curriculum** and to monitor progress throughout the year. The assessment should be completed three times—during Weeks 1, 19, and 36—and is most effective when done one-on-one. Assessment sheets can be found in the Activity Book. Activity: Silent Tower

Having the child sit beside you, explain that you're building a tower together with blocks. The child is the foreman and gives directions while you build. Halfway through, tell the child he may no longer speak and must only point. Pretend to misunderstand to show how hard teamwork can be without clear communication. Tie the activity to the Bible story and discuss the shapes of the blocks.

Group Activity: Take turns allowing each child to direct you where to place a block, either with words or gestures.

Character

Humility

Definition: Considering others ahead of yourself, serving

Opposite: Pride, arrogance

Humility is the opposite of pride. It puts the focus on what God is doing and how one can serve others. Having a teachable spirit is also a sign of humility.

Teach: Ask for Forgiveness

Showing humility means admitting when you've hurt someone and asking for forgiveness. Use this four-step guide to teach a child how to apologize:

1. Say sorry for exactly what was done.
2. Explain why it was wrong.
3. Suggest a better choice for next time. For example: "Next time I'll wait until you're ready to share."
4. Ask the person to forgive you.

Activity: Sportsmanship

Winning and losing give a child a chance to practice humility. Play a board game or a simple rolling-a-ball activity as a friendly competition. If the child doesn't win, help them say "Good job" and celebrate the other person's success. If the child does win, guide them to accept the win gracefully by thanking the other person for playing.


This week's focus is on shapes: oval, heart, rectangle, triangle, circle, square, star, and diamond. Talk about these shapes throughout all activities, during play, and in everyday moments. Shapes matter—not just for drawing—but because letters and numbers are made of shapes. A child needs to be able to tell shapes apart before being able to distinguish between letters like "A" and "O."

It's very normal for a child to still mix up a few shape names when entering kindergarten, so don't worry if that happens. Just keep pointing them out and talking about them week after week—eventually, it will click! If the child is just now being introduced to shapes, it's best to start with one shape per week to build a strong foundation. Shape activities, songs, and books are available in the QR code.

Classroom Centers

For Preschools: Children learn best through play. Any underlined activity (like the two listed this week) may be used as a learning center in the classroom. Centers offer hands-on, play-based opportunities where the child guides the learning. Discover more in the QR code.





As the child cuts, remind them that the dominant hand should hold the scissors and do the cutting, while the other hand moves the paper. Also, watch to make sure the child's elbows stay close to the body and don't point outward while cutting. Learn more in the QR code.



Gross Motor Activity: Shape Walk

Use painter's tape to make large outlines on the floor of a rectangle, triangle, diamond, and star. Call out a shape and have the child walk, crawl, or hop to the shape. If the child is ready, have him identify the shape and then walk toe to heel along the edges of the shapes.



Visual Perception Activity: Color Tracking

Adult: On the Color Tracking 1 activity sheet, use the corresponding colored pencil to underline each color word. This helps the child connect the written word with the color it represents. Give the child small colored blocks to use as markers. Teach the child to place one colored block at a time, moving from left to right and top to bottom—just like reading. At the end of the week, invite the child to color the shapes on the activity sheet using broken crayons.




Overview






