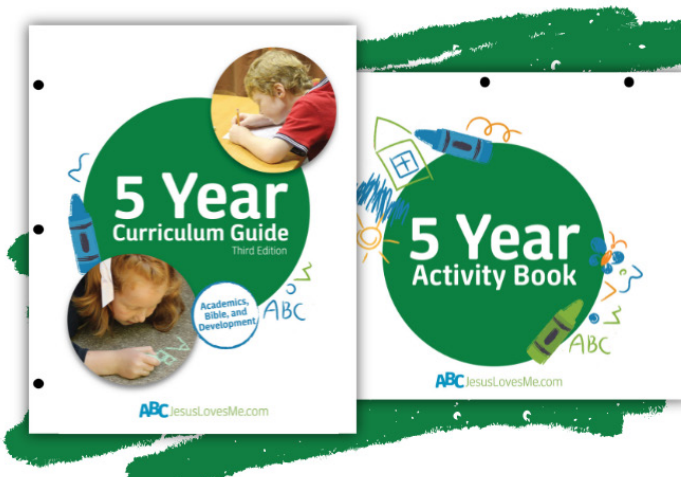

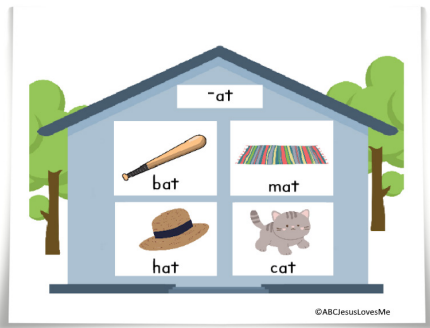
Phonics

Repeating, manipulating, hearing, and combining phonetic sounds form the foundation of reading and are further developed in the *5 Year Curriculum*. The child strengthens letter sound knowledge through the Apple Phonics Chant and Letter Phonic Songs. Each week, the child adds an apple to a large tree displayed on the wall, reinforcing learning in a visual and engaging way.

Word Families

During the curriculum, the child will also be introduced to Word Families. Word Families are groups of words that have a similar pattern making them appear to be related or part of a “family.” In this curriculum, the words have the same ending and thus rhyme. Grouping these rhyming words allows children to quickly read words in the pattern. If ready, this is the first step in reading CVC (consonant, vowel, consonant) words. The following Word Families are introduced:

- -at, -an
- -ox
- -ip, -it
- -et, -en
- -ug

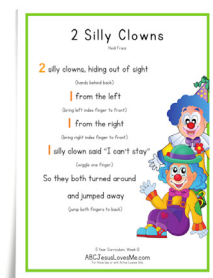

Poems

Rhyming is introduced through poems, songs, and books. While it may seem silly to adults, rhyming is fun for children and plays an important role in reading success. As a key phonemic awareness skill, rhyming helps children hear and manipulate sounds in words, strengthening their oral language. It also helps them recognize the rhythm of language, which supports fluency and comprehension. Below are some of the poems the child will enjoy learning.

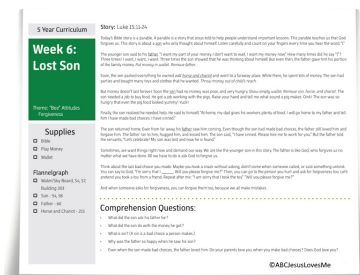

Overview

The *5 Year Curriculum* includes Bible themes that help the child understand God beyond the basic Bible stories introduced in the preschool years. Activities reinforce what the child is learning about the truth of God's Word. Optional flannelgraph suggestions add visual and tactile learning opportunities. Comprehension questions at the end of each story provide a natural way to continue the conversation.



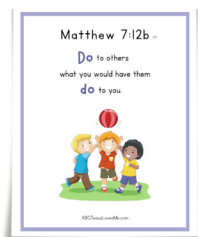

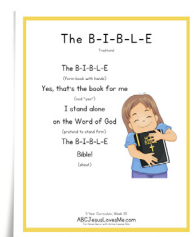

Books of the Bible

To study the Bible effectively, I believe it is important to know the order of the Books of the Bible. With fun repetition, most preschool children can learn this skill. In the Curriculum, the Old Testament books are divided into small groups, introduced gradually every few weeks, following the pattern of a simple song. The Old Testament Song is included in the Bible Song Packet, with a video available on the website.

Literacy

Overview

Each Lesson Plan includes a Book of the Week that connects to the weekly theme. These carefully selected classic books are ideal for preschool-age children and support key learning goals. Curriculum suggestions help the adult build interest in the story, support comprehension, encourage imagination, and teach the child to use visual clues while reading. Once familiar with the book, the child is encouraged to fill in key words and rhyming words and discuss vocabulary by breaking words into syllables. Additional activities provide even more opportunities for learning and practice.

Pragmatics

Overview

Pragmatics is the study of language in social settings—essentially, communication. Many children struggle to express themselves appropriately or understand messages conveyed through facial expressions, body language, tone of voice, and other non-verbal cues. While some children learn naturally by example, others need explicit teaching to navigate different situations. Each review week in the *5 Year Curriculum* focuses on pragmatics, using role-play, puppets, teachable moments, conversation, and books to help the child understand social interactions and the world around them.

Development

Overview

Fine motor skills develop a child’s ability to manipulate small objects and prepare for writing. Gross motor skills involve large muscle movements, such as running, jumping, and hopping, and support balance and coordination. Each Lesson Plan includes activities designed to strengthen both fine and gross motor skills. For best results, use crayons and pencils rather than markers or pens. Sample activities are provided below. Along with fine and gross motor activities, each Lesson Plan in the *ABCJesusLovesMe 5 Year Curricula* contains visual perception activities.

Visual perception is the process of translating to the brain what the eyes see, which is essential for reading and writing. These activities can help correct visual perception issues as well as strengthen brain-eye communication.

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Bible

Unique to the *5 Year Curriculum*, the child is introduced to Bible themes that go beyond the basic stories learned in preschool. Each week includes activities that support the story. It is important to read the Scripture yourself so you are familiar with the details. The ABCJLM Interactive Bible Stories provide an age-appropriate script and questions to help the child engage with the story. This resource is included in the Curriculum Bundle or can be purchased separately as a digital download.

Bible Songs and Memory Verses

Timeless Bible songs have been chosen to help the child memorize and enjoy God's Word. Each week also introduces a simple memory verse set to song. Free videos with actions are available through QR codes if the songs are new to you. The Bible Song and Memory Verse Digital Download Packets, included in the Bundles, are other helpful tools.

Old Testament Books of the Bible

To study the Bible well, it is also important to learn the order of the Books of the Bible. With repetition and song, most preschoolers can do this. In the Curriculum, the Old Testament books are taught in small groups every few weeks using a simple song (pg 110). The Old Testament Song is viewable with the QR code.

Example Weekly Bible Schedule

Day 1: **Read** the story from *The Beginner's Bible* or *My First Hands-On Bible*, using the page number listed in the Supplies. If not available, read from an adult Bible.

Day 2: Read the **Interactive Bible Story script**. Use optional visuals such as flannelgraph or simple props.

Day 3: **Review** the script by reading it again, pausing to let the child fill in key points, names, or actions.

Day 4: Guide the child in **retelling** the story by prompting with simple questions (Who? What happened next?). Act out parts of the story together using motions or props.

Day 5: **Comprehension questions** are included in the Interactive Bible Stories Digital Download.

Unsure How to Teach?

Teaching a child a new concept can feel daunting. Where do I begin? What do I say? When do I say it? How do I get the child to sit still? Find the answers to these questions by scanning the QR code provided on pg 7.

"I am Learning" Objective Poster



The Objective Poster (found in the *5 Year Activity Book*) helps you track the weekly objectives. Transfer these objectives to the activity sheet and display it in a visible place. After a couple of times, this transfer usually takes less than 10 minutes. To reuse the sheet, place it in a dry erase pocket or picture frame and use a dry or wet erase marker. Preschools can also send the updated sheet home each week to encourage learning beyond the classroom.

Broken Crayons/Rainbow Write

The goal for handwriting is for the child to hold a utensil with the thumb and index finger, resting on the middle finger. A short pencil with a grip works best. If the child struggles, occupational therapists suggest using broken crayons under one inch long, which naturally encourage a proper grip. The child will also practice "rainbow writing," tracing letters or numbers in several colors on the same page. This allows extra practice in a fun way. Do not push the child beyond what they are ready for. If needed, use the *4 Year Curriculum* for more handwriting practice. More tips are available through the QR code.

Starting the 5 Year Curriculum

Phonics & Handwriting

Phonics

Reading begins with repeating, hearing, and blending sounds. In the *5 Year Curriculum*, the child will use Letter activity sheets, manipulate the phonetic sound through the Apple Chant, and then add it to a word family.

Letter Activity Sheets

Handwriting activity sheets in this Curriculum give practice writing the Letter and Number (starting Week 10) of the Week while also building phonics, number skills, creativity, and art. These activity sheets assume the child can already hold a pencil and write with little assistance. If not, it may be best to use the *4 Year Curriculum* first. Letters are not introduced in order but are tied to the Word Family. For extra practice, the separate *Handwriting Curriculum* is available through the QR code.

Each handwriting lesson includes five steps: write the name with a capital letter followed by lowercase letters, write the capital and lowercase letter four times each, highlight the letter in words, draw two objects that start with the sound, and circle the letter in the alphabet. Because handwriting takes time, it is best done one-on-one and may be spread over several days. Use a short pencil with grip, if needed, for proper grasp.

Teaching: Formation Rhymes and Chants

Letters: A few basic movements create all 26 letters of the alphabet. Simple Formation Chants have been created to teach these repeated motions. Say these chants each time the child forms a letter to promote muscle memory and correct writing habits.

Numbers: A Number Rhyme is included for each number to assist the child in learning number formation. The original source of the rhymes is unknown.

Apple Tree and Chant

Using large pieces of green and brown paper, create an Apple Tree on the wall. Cut out apples from the Apple template in the *5 Year Activity Book* using different colors of construction paper. Write the letters of the week on individual apples and add to the tree. Review daily by counting apples, naming colors, and saying the letter, its sound, and a word that begins with it (e.g. A /a/ apple). By the end of the year, the tree will have 52 apples. Each week also use the Apple Chant to play with words by changing the beginning letter. Laugh together about the funny words you create. Remind the child not to add an extra vowel to consonants (for example, say /k/ instead of /kuh/). Have the child feel the puff of air when saying sounds like /k/.

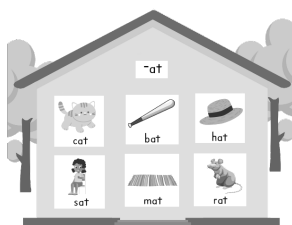

Word Families

Word Families are introduced in this Curriculum. These are groups of words with the same ending making them appear to be related or part of a “family.” Grouping rhyming words allows children to quickly read words in the pattern.

Some children may be ready to blend sounds into CVC words. To help, use arm motions—touch the shoulder for the first sound, the elbow for the second, and the hand for the third, then slide down the arm to blend the sounds together. If the child is not ready, wait and try again later. The Word Family Packet is available in the Bundle. Do not begin Word Families until the child can hear and create rhymes, which is practiced in the *4 Year Curriculum*.



Themes

Each week also includes themes that introduce the child to the world around them through poems, math, science, social studies, and developmental activities.

Poems

Phonemic Awareness

Phonemic awareness—the ability to hear, identify, and manipulate individual sounds—is critical for reading and spelling success. In the *5 Year Curriculum*, this important skill is introduced each week through fingerplays, poems, and books.

Although these activities may seem silly to adults, they are both fun for the child and essential for early literacy development. Rhyming helps the child hear and play with sounds in words, improves oral language skills, and builds a strong foundation for reading fluency and comprehension. As the child becomes familiar with poems and books, they begin to anticipate rhyming words and recognize the rhythm of language.

Children develop phonemic awareness at their own pace. Introduce and discuss rhymes patiently, trusting that with time, the child's skills will grow naturally.

The Poem Digital Download Packet, included in the Bundle, is a useful tool for posting and practicing poems. The visuals are especially helpful for children from diverse backgrounds or with vocabulary delays, helping them connect words to images.



Math/Science

Math activities introduce the child to patterns, counting, calendars, sorting, etc. Some of these objectives may be above the child's development. *And that's okay.* Introduction is key and retention is an added bonus!

Books

Experts agree that children should be read to for at least 15 minutes a day. Each week the child will be introduced to a quality picture book to supplement other learning and provide pre-reading exposure. For the greatest benefit, read the selected book aloud at least once every day. As Melissa McCall from MovingLittleMinds.com explains, “When young children hear the same story, song, or phrase repeatedly, their brains are actually building and strengthening neural pathways. These connections—formed through repeated, familiar experiences—lay the foundation for memory, language development, and deeper understanding.” In addition to daily reading, each week also includes a literacy activity designed to prepare the child for more advanced reading skills.

Example Weekly Reading Schedule

Day 1: Picture Walk

Before reading, guide the child through a “picture walk.” Look through the illustrations together and predict what the story might be about. Encourage the child to describe what they see and make guesses about the plot. This helps build excitement for the story, improves comprehension, stimulates creativity, and teaches children to use visual cues as a reading tool. Learn more in the QR code.

Day 2: Read with Expression

Read the book aloud with excitement and animated voice changes. Use facial expressions and tone to bring the story to life and keep the child engaged.

Day 3: Vocabulary

Each week I have selected words from the books that the child may or may not be familiar with. These words are purposefully chosen to expand the child’s vocabulary, especially for dual language learners. For each word, provide extra context to help the child understand its meaning. Introduce more or less words based on the child’s exposure and interest.

Day 4: Make Connections

While reading, connect the story to the child’s own experiences. Ask questions like, “Have you ever felt like the character?” or “When have you done something similar?”

Day 5: Summarize the Story

Help the child retell the story by identifying what happened at the beginning, middle, and end. Encourage the child to use their own words and point to illustrations for support if needed. Being able to determine the key points is a crucial learning step.

Most activities may be completed in any order and this is provided as a suggestion. Select the options that best fit the child’s needs and your setting—it is not required to complete every activity. Multiple choices are included to offer flexibility, address varying developmental levels, and support children who are dual language learners.

Development

Fine and Gross Motor Activities

Fine motor skills involve the ability to manipulate small objects and write, while gross motor skills focus on large muscle movements like running, jumping, and hopping. Both types of skills are important for pencil control, balance, and coordination. Each Lesson Plan includes activities to strengthen both skills.

Children develop fine motor skills best when they work on a vertical surface. While holding a writing utensil or brush against a vertical surface, muscles in the wrist and hand are strengthened. These same muscles are not used when writing on a horizontal surface. For this reason, place craft, writing, and drawing projects on a vertical surface as much as is feasible (i.e. on an easel, wall, or door). Instead of using markers and pens, use broken crayons and short pencils to better support muscle development.

Visual Perception Activities

Each Lesson Plan in the *5 Year Curriculum* includes a visual perception activity. Visual perception refers to how the brain interprets what the eyes see, and accurate perception is essential for reading and writing. These activities not only help address visual perception issues but also strengthen the connection between the brain and eyes. Some activities may be challenging for the child, while others may be easier. Additional activity sheets can be purchased through the *ABCJLM Visual Perception Curriculum* to provide further support. Throughout the Lesson Plans, Intentional Play ideas are included to help you naturally weave learning into play. These suggestions often work well as learning center activities.

Jesus is Immanuel which means "God with us" (Isaiah 7:14, Matthew 1:23). God sent His Son to be born as a baby so that Jesus could live among man. Jesus loved God so much that Jesus wanted to obey God. Baptism is a sign that you love God and want to obey Him. After being baptized, God stated that Jesus is His Son and He is very pleased in Him (Matthew 3:17).

Activity: Shamrock

Although the Trinity is a difficult concept, it is important to introduce the child to God as three-in-one. Begin with the Shamrock activity sheet. Have the child trace "God" on the stem, then explain that God is revealed in three ways. This week, introduce "God the Father" as the first part of the Trinity. Have the child trace the leaf labeled "Father," but do not color at this time.

Introduce the child to the first five books of the Bible—Genesis through Numbers. The Old Testament Song, included in the Bible Song Packet, can be watched by scanning the QR code.

Intentional Play

Ask the child, "Who is always with you? Who loves you no matter what? Who knows everything about you?" (God)

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Classroom Centers

For Preschools: Children learn best through play. Any underlined activity (like the two listed this week) may be used as a learning center in the classroom. Centers offer hands-on, play-based opportunities where the child guides the learning. Discover more in the QR code.

Theme

All About Me

Teaching: Intro

In this week's Bible story, we learn that God created many things in six days simply by speaking. When God said, "Let there be plants," plants appeared. When God said, "Let the skies be filled with birds," birds filled the sky. God saw all that He created as good—thumbs up! But when God created people, He thought, "Wow!" God saw people as very good—two thumbs up! God created each person fearfully and wonderfully, unique and special, with a plan (Psalm 139:13–14, 119:73–74; Jeremiah 1:4–5, 29:11; Ephesians 2:10).

Activity: Hair and Hygiene

It is important to teach proper hygiene and self-care. *In preschool, practice with dolls and include information in newsletters for families.*

Hair: Help the child practice brushing. Provide a quality brush or comb and, if needed, a spray bottle. Teach the child to mist the whole head instead of spraying in one spot. Most preschoolers cannot wash their own hair yet, but encourage the child to rub shampoo throughout the scalp while you assist.

Body: Role play giving a doll a bath. Show how to wash the face, ears, arms, armpits, stomach, legs, and feet. Use a sponge with a little soap and teach washing from the top of the body down to the toes.

This is also an important time to discuss body safety. Teach the child the difference between safe and unsafe touching. Explain that no one should touch the child's "swimsuit area," and the child should not touch or look at another person's area either.

Intentional Play

Provide the child with dolls or teddy bears to care for using a hairbrush and washcloth.

Activity: All About Me Book

This activity includes scissor use, handwriting, and other learning opportunities. Spend multiple days on this fun activity.

Step #1: Cut apart the boxes (*Visual Perception Activity*)

Step #2: Fill in each square using a pencil and crayons.

Step #3: (Adult assistance) Bind in the corner with string or a stapler.

Step #4: When finished, let the child "read" the book to others.

If the child cannot complete these activities with little assistance, it may be best to review the 4 Year Curriculum first.

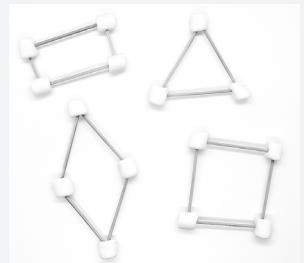
Math

Teach: Shapes

Use this week to check that the child knows the basic shapes—oval, heart, rectangle, triangle, circle, square, star, and diamond. It is normal for preschoolers to confuse one or two shapes.

Activity: Pretzel Shapes

Practice building shapes with pretzel sticks (or toothpicks) and marshmallows, pressing the pretzels into the marshmallows to hold them together to form various shapes.



Activity: Draw Shapes

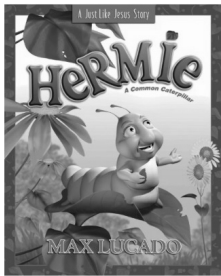
In sand, fingerpaint, or shaving cream, give the child a direction such as "Draw a triangle," repeating it only twice to encourage memory and focus.

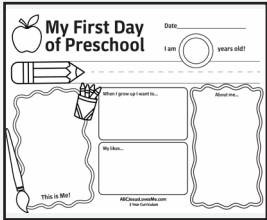

Visual Perception Activity: Scissors Use

Cut apart the boxes of the "All About Me" Book. When cutting, remind the child that his dominant hand does the cutting while the other hand moves the paper. Watch that the elbows do not point out while cutting and that thumbs stay up. Scan the QR code for more tips for teaching scissors use.

Activity: My First Day of Preschool

Invite the child to draw a picture of himself, then complete each information section adding the child's responses. Activity: What's in the Bag?

Place toy animals and objects in a bag. Have the child pull one out of the bag and name the object. Explain that it isn't really a _____ (e.g. dog, book), but a picture or a symbol of the object. Use this analogy to introduce the Bible story symbolism of baptism.

Activity: Shamrock

Trace the shamrock leaf labeled "Son."



Activity: Music

Give the child simple percussion instruments like jingle bells, a tambourine, or a maraca to play while singing the Bible songs or saying the poem. Encourage the child to clap or shake the instrument to the beat, which helps develop rhythm awareness—an important skill that supports early literacy and reading development.

Intro

Last week we learned God the Father. Introduce the child to God the Son - Jesus - as the second part of the Trinity. The Gospel Books contain many stories of Jesus, but the story of Jesus' Baptism is where God called Jesus His Son.

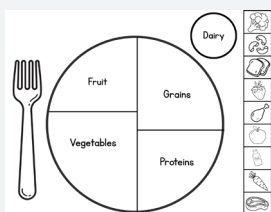

Keeping My Body Strong

Activity: Nutrition with MyPlate

It is important for preschoolers to eat a variety of foods. Use the MyPlate activity sheet to show that half of a meal should be fruits and vegetables, while the other half is grains and protein. Instruct the child to cut off the pictures of food on the sheet and glue them into the correct section of the plate.



Activity: MyPlate Pizza

Hawaiian Pizza is a fun and simple way to demonstrate the breakdown of MyPlate. Use the MyPlate activity sheet while preparing a home-made pizza, matching the ingredient to each section on the sheet.

Pizza dough – Grain (make with whole wheat flour and talk about how at least half of the grains eaten should be whole grain)

Tomato sauce – Vegetables

Cheese – Dairy

Pineapple – Fruit

Ham – Protein

If a kitchen is not available, create the pizza pieces out of construction paper and assemble them on a paper plate.

Describe a colored food item allowing the child to guess the item you are describing. For example, "I spy an orange food that is round." The child guesses correctly an orange. This activity can occur during lunch, in circle time, at recess, or in the car.

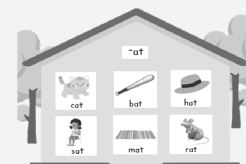

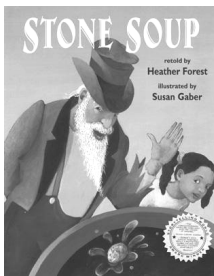
These words rhyme. Bat and cat live in the same house because they end the same way." Add the pictures to the house with sticky tack and have the child say the rhyming words.



For the next two weeks, add more -at words from the lesson plans. If the child suggests a word that doesn't rhyme, such as "mouse" for "rat," guide by asking, "Do bat and mouse have the same ending? No. What is another word for this picture that belongs in our -at house?"

Development

Fine Motor Activity: Stone Soup

Make stone soup to share with others, following the recipe found in many versions of the book. This hands-on experience helps the child remember the story and talk about nutrition. In preschool settings, another option is to make trail mix, with each child bringing one ingredient.

Gross Motor Activity: Twister

Show the child a crayon. Ask the child to name the color, then stand on a matching colored dot made from construction paper or a Twister game mat. Focus on the basic colors: black, white, blue, brown, green, yellow, orange, red, purple.

Visual Perception Activity: Food Tracking

Adult: On the Food Tracking activity sheet, use the corresponding crayon to underline each color word. Discuss each food and the food group it belongs in. Give the child small colored blocks to use as markers. Teach the child to place one colored block at a time, moving from left to right and top to bottom—just like reading. At the end of the week, invite the child to color the food on the activity sheet using broken crayons.

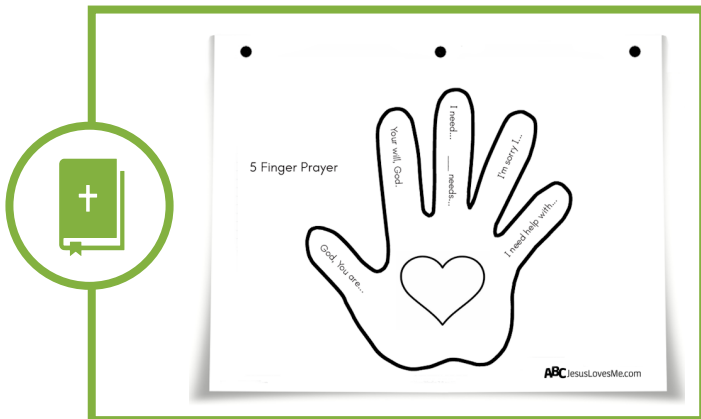

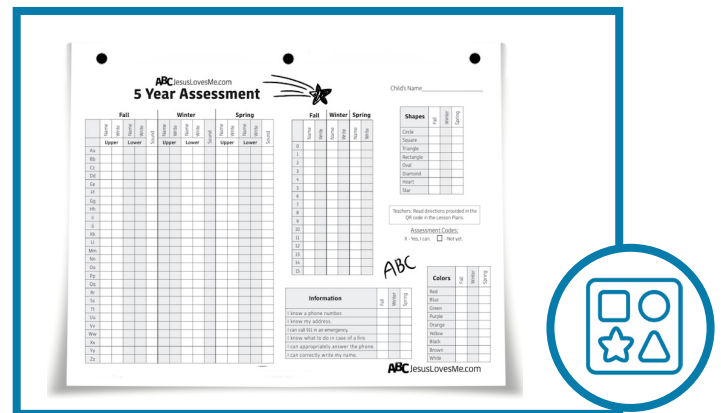
Overview

Story: Luke 2:1-7

Tell me the best gift you have ever received. I have a secret to tell you—Jesus is the best gift I have ever received. Jesus is the best gift you could ever receive! Let me tell you a true story from the Bible.

One day, Gabriel, the angel, appeared to Mary and said, "Greetings! The Lord is with you." Pretend to be an angel and say, "Greetings!" Mary was very confused. Show me a confused face. The angel said, "You are going to have a baby, and you will name Him 'Jesus.' He is the Son of God."

Mary said, "This is impossible!" The angel replied, "Nothing is impossible with God." Mary said, "I am the Lord's servant." That meant Mary was saying she would do whatever God wanted her to do.

Mary and Joseph were about to be married. Joseph was a carpenter, or builder, and he lived in Nazareth. But Joseph's family was from Bethlehem.

Let's look at this map of Israel. Here is Nazareth, and here is Bethlehem. *Point to the cities on the map.*

The leader, Caesar, ordered everyone to go back to the place where they were born so he could count how many people were in his kingdom. That might sound easy, but the distance from Nazareth to Bethlehem is about 90 miles. That would take about 1 ½ hours by car today! But Mary and Joseph didn't have a car. They had to walk or ride a donkey for several days to get to Bethlehem.

When they arrived, the city was full of people! All the inns—like hotels—were full. There was no room for them. "No room!" said one innkeeper. "Nope, no room!" said another. "Sorry, we're full!" said yet another. Finally, one innkeeper saw how close it was for Mary to have her baby. He said, "You can stay in my stable." *Switch boards and add Mary, Joseph, a stool, and the donkey.*

A stable is like a barn, where animals eat and sleep. And while Mary and Joseph were in the stable, baby Jesus was born. Mary wrapped Jesus in cloth and laid Him in a manger, which is where the animals eat.

Let's pretend to wrap baby Jesus in cloth and lay Him in the manger. *With your arm as a baby, pretend to wrap your arm.* And just like that, the best gift of all was born!

Now, I have a very hard question for you. Why is Jesus the best gift of all? The answer is: Because Jesus is God's Son, and He loves us so much that He was born as a baby, lived a perfect life as a man, died on the cross for our sins, was buried, and then rose again. That's a lot of love. Love is the greatest gift Jesus could have given us.

Comprehension Questions:

- What is your favorite part of this story?
- Why did God send His Son as a baby?
- The Bible says that Jesus loves us so much that He humbled Himself and became a man (Philippians 2:5-8). Do you think it was hard for Jesus to leave Heaven and come down to Earth as a baby?
- Why do we celebrate Christmas?
